"ANGELS ANSWERED" Putnam Partners Help Purchase Camp

hen Executive Director, Bob Gentile and MTOM

Chairperson, Patti Haar started the "Calling All Angels" campaign last year, the hopes and prayers of everyone with a connection to Camp Herrlich was that the camp could be saved, that enough money would be nised to purchase the camp property and continue our mission.

One year - 12 short months - was all we had to exercise our "right of first refusal" as stipulated in our long-term lease agreement with Lutheran Social Services. The Metropolitan New York

based agency had been Camp Herrlich's landlord for many years. Their decision to sell the Camp Herrlich property was a financial one. After months of appealing to the compassion and generosity of camp friends, parents and community members, MTOM was still in need of a significant amount of funds in order to secure a purchase agreement.

Bob Gentile made one last attempt, at the eleventh hour of the contract's expiration date, to reach out to Putnam County officials. Legislators agreed that the protection of the 156-acre camp was very worthwhile. As a leader in the preservation of

open space, the county was now determined to forever protect the natural habitat of Camp Herricht, The camp's 9acre lake drains into the Muddy Brook, which flows into the Coton River and the Great Swamp. One of the state's largest freshwater wetlands, the swamp forms the headwaters of the city's Croton Reservoir system.

With the support of New York State Senator Vincent Leibell and Putnam County Executive Robert Bondi, Putnam County will purchase the land with the

assistance of New York City watershed monies as well as county borrowings. The DEP funding source will ensure the restriction of development on the property.

State and county monies in the amount of \$700,000 have been authorized for the purchase. The county will borrow the remaining \$750,000 needed to purchase the property, which will be reimbursed by MTOM through long-term use fees paid to Putnam County.

This exciting new partnership with the County ensures that the programs

> provided by MTOM to the Tri-State community will continue long into the future; and that the Camp Hertlich property will forever remain as open space. As a result of this partnership, the County and State will also help MTOM improve the Camp Hertlich property, along with the "Calling All Angels" contributors.

Thus far, the "Calling All Angels" campaign has raised almost \$350,000 in gifts, and long and short term pledges. Continuation of efforts to raise money will help secure the future of sustaining MTOM programs at Camp Hertlich. Camp Wilbur Herrlich Mt. illness, the Herrlich farm was gifted to the Inner Mission Society of New York in 1922.

During the 1950's, the Inner Mission Society became Lutheran Social Services. LSS made

modifications to the Camp Herrlich facility in order to accommodate the growing number of children being serviced. In 1978, Mount Tremper Outdoor Ministries, Inc. took responsibility for the management and operation of Camp Herrlich.

What started out to be a summer camp is now a yearround facility, serving thousands of families and children; hosting church, school, and community group retreats, operating three after school programs for our local school district students, vacation camps, summer day camp, summer resident camp, and summer travel camp and is a
