And So It Was With Matt Lamb



One of Matt's good friends and a friend of Camp Herrlich, Robert Lipton, had spent the better part of the last year fundraising for, physically participating in, and recruiting friends to help with the renovation. Rob managed to get Home Depot to substantially discount materials for the project and send over many volunteers. Our caretaker, Miles Barnett, headed up the building project and without Miles... well... a lot of things would be undone. There was also another unsung hero in this renovation project. Patrick Roy, an employee of Home Depot, worked tirelessly to support us in this endeavor. We all feel that the renovation was a way to honor Matt's timeless gifts to our campers and staff. Rob Lipton instinctively knew how much we loved Matt and how much Matt loved camp.

There was once an ugly, steel-poled, outdoor basketball court. It was the kind you might find in the heart of the city on the corner of Broadway and "such and such," but this court sat at the edge of the beautiful woods here at camp. Sometime in the mid '90s the old court was transformed into our Arts and Crafts pavilion. Matt Lamb spent so many days in the shelter of this pavilion, working with children, doing art and crafts projects, eating canteen purchases from the camp store, practicing for skits, wrapping presents for Christmas in July, making banners for his group, or just chillin' with his kids. It seemed perfectly fitting and campish to change this well-used space into something much more useable for our camp children/families. Rob and Bob began the task of design and idea. When it was done many months later, the Lambs and some of Matt's closest friends were invited for a ribbon cutting. When the 25 people we expected turned into fifty, then to one hundred, and when the ambulances showed up and the fire fighters came from many neighboring counties, we just smiled at one another and put more hors d'oeuvres in the ovens. When Donald Smith, the County Sheriff, showed up, followed by Senator Liebell, John Tully, the Deputy County Executive, loving friends with tears in their eyes, the Honorable Judge Reitz, Matt's family, and his camp family, we

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ENVIRONMENTAL ED Native American

Did you know that Camp Herrlich is a BOCES-certified environmental education center? Here are some of the fascinating and fun programs we offer:

Cooking: Students engage in making Native foods in the traditional manner. They may cut corn from the cob to make corn soup, or pick wild edibles to season the Three Sisters stew, or bake a whole fish or potato in clay, or grind corn.

Corn Husk Doll Making: Together we learn how to make a corn husk doll using real corn husks. Each student makes a doll to take home. The importance of corn is related, including how nothing is wasted. Even the corn husk gets used!

Traditional Native Games: Learning about Native American life and its values is child's play when experienced through games. This is a great class for learning about another culture and for breaking up the day.

Ethnobotany: Native Americans are thoroughly versed in the uses of our wild and cultivated plants. We will take a field walk to explore the many uses of wild plants and maybe sample some edible ones. This class will change the way you look at plants.

Maple Sugaring: Mmmmm... that sweet taste of real maple syrup. We learn tree anatomy and the process of syrup making. This class is *very* weather dependent (late winter-early spring) and may involve some physical labor. *We will assign an alternate class if we are unable to run this class due to weather.*

Native American Pottery: Using self hardening clay, the students will pinch and coil the clay incorporating Native American methods. We will look at authentic Native American designs and decorate our bowls. We will discuss what inspired these designs and how they were used in everyday living.

Native American Encampment: View artifacts and experience life in either an Eastern Woodland or a Great Plains camp. This is a great opportunity for students to learn about the ingenuity and philosophy of native peoples that allowed them to live comfortably and in harmony with their environment. This class is taught by people who have years of experience in primitive technology and might not always be available.

Director's Discoveries

Usually when we tell people that we work at a summer camp, the response is "Oh! What do you do the rest of the year?" Generally, we laugh knowingly and then rattle off the following sentence in one breath: Before and After School programs, Environmental Education and Reach the Peak programs, the Cooperative Learning Academy, (an alternative learning setting and GED prep for high school students), Weekend Retreats, Vacation Camps, networking, interviewing, and hiring new staff for next summer, and of course preparing for the upcoming summer season. We gasp for air, their eyes widen, and they say "I had no idea Camp Herrlich had that much going on!" Now that they, and you, know how much we have going on in the fall, winter, and spring seasons, here's a synopsis of how all our programs are going.



Before and After School Programs

Our enrollment in our Before and After School Programs is about 150 students from the Carmel School District. In addition to the warm and welcoming environment, homework help, snack, sports and games, arts and crafts, and character education programs, the students in the programs have gone on field trips and taken computer, library, and sign language classes. The children in the After School Program even went Christmas caroling at the Plaza at Clover Lake Retirement Community in Carmel. Their effort and enthusiasm was greatly appreciated by the residents there.

Environmental Education

We are looking forward to seeing all our "regular" school groups again this year, and we know that under the direction of Carol Chu, their programs will be as fun and educational as always. Last year we continued to build our relationships with Queens Lutheran School, Long Island Lutheran High School, Fostertown Magnet School in Newburgh, PS 130 in Manhattan, PS 85 in the Bronx, and Carl C. Icahn Charter School in the Bronx. We also look forward to building new relationships and offering our extensive Environmental Education programs to new schools.

Reach the Peak

Camp Herrlich's Reach the Peak programs are perfect for team building, beginning-of-year getting-toknow-you sessions, end-of-year cele-brations, and everything in between. Carmel School District takes great advantage of our Reach the Peak programs, sending the Middle School General Organization and the Alternative High School and Bridge programs for day trips.

Cooperative Learning Academy

The Cooperative Learning Academy (CLA) continues to take advantage of the beautiful space and supportive staff at Camp Herrlich throughout the school year. They have entered into a community service relationship with Cascade Farm & Farm School, also in Patterson, and participated in a fundraiser and field trip to the Putnam Humane Society in addition to their regular classes. Students continue to improve their academic standing, attendance, emotional state, and study habits in this program. Those who choose to also can get intensive GED preparation during their time at Herrlich.

Weekend Retreats

Memorial Hall is a great addition of space to all of Camp Herrlich's programs, but mostly to our Weekend Retreats. It can be used for worship services, team building programs, lectures, education, or recreation. Memorial Hall also houses the camp store, which is open for all groups to get Herrlich merchandise. Groups from such churches as Ascension Lutheran, St. John's, Our Redeemer, Cross of Christ, and Gloria Dei and Boy Scout Troop 1, to name a few, make up the core of our weekend retreat groups. Thanks to all who keep coming year after year!
